HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF OUR FOUNDER

Servant of God Louis Savinien Dupuis, MEP

The founder of our Congregation, Servant of God Louis Savinien Dupuis, MEP, was a French missionary of profound faith and dedication. Born on August 18, 1806, in the city of Sanz, France, he was the son of Etheme Louis Dupuis and Vigthnar Remi. "Dupuis" was the family name. He completed his secondary education at Sebastian High School in Sanz. Ordained as a priest on April 25, 1829, he subsequently joined the Congregation of MEP on May 25, 1831. Known for his fervor and zeal, Father Dupuis exemplified heroic faith and boundless charity.

Throughout his life, he devoted himself to the service of the Church, working tirelessly to restore moral integrity. He sought to perfect the virtue of charity in service to God's Kingdom, dedicating his efforts to the glory of God, the edification of the Church, and the salvation of souls. On July 4, 1831, he embarked on a missionary journey to India, arriving on April 9, 1832, to begin his ministry.

In 19th-century India, the erroneous belief that women should not receive an education was deeply entrenched. Educated women often felt shame in revealing their literacy. At the Synod of 1844, it was determined that a Congregation of women was essential to liberate them from this societal oppression. Thus, the Congregation began to take shape, expanding with the establishment of numerous convents and schools. The Synod envisioned a community of Indian sisters entrusted with the moral, religious, and secular education of women.

At this pivotal moment, Servant of God Louis Savinien Dupuis, MEP, driven by his ardent commitment to fulfilling the Divine will, stepped forward to realize this vision. On October 16, 1884, he founded the Franciscan Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Congregation. Until his passing on June 4, 1874, he worked indefatigably for the growth and flourishing of the Congregation. His successors, following in his footsteps, continued to nurture its development.

Through the sacrifices and perseverance of our forebears, the Congregation now extends its mission throughout India and beyond.

Our Congregation

In the mid-19th century, the socio-political climate of Tamil Nadu mirrored the dire conditions of a third-world nation. Women were shackled by societal norms, treated as subservient to men, and relegated to the status of second-class citizens. The education of women was a forsaken concept in Tamil society, dismissed as unnecessary. Missionaries, however, believed that empowering women through education was the key to restoring their dignity and uplifting the social fabric of families.

At this turning point, the Synod of Pondicherry Convened from January 18 to February 13, 1844, under the stewardship of Mgr. Clement Bonnard, the Bishop of the Pondicherry mission. Among the many urgent matters discussed, the education of girl children emerged as a matter of paramount importance. In response, Fr. Dupuis was entrusted with three monumental tasks:

- Establish a Printing Press to facilitate learning and communication.
- Found a new Indigenous Women Religious Congregation with the primary goal of educating girls.
- Establish Schools specifically for the education of female children.
- Battling Opposition with Vision and Courage

Introducing the radical idea of women's education in a conservative society was met with fierce resistance. Yet, undeterred by opposition, Fr. Dupuis, a man of unwavering vision and unyielding resolve, pursued his mission with relentless courage and wisdom. His tireless efforts bore fruit on October 16, 1844, with the founding of the Congregation of Franciscan Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (FIHM) for Indigenous women. The first Mother Superior, Sr. Theresammal from Carmel Convent, along with novices Savariammal and Annammal from Cuddalore, and Theresa from Pondicherry, laid the foundation for this pioneering institution.

By 1864, the Congregation received canonical approval from Msgr. Godelle, and on July 18, 1886, it was formally aggregated to the Third Order of St. Francis of Assisi.

A Legacy of Education and Empowerment

On October 17, 1844, Fr. Dupuis inaugurated the Immaculate Heart of Mary Girls' School, a modest institution that has since grown into a thriving Higher Secondary School with 6,000 female students, standing proudly on Mission Street, Pondicherry, opposite the Archbishop's House.

Though frail in health, Fr. Dupuis was formidable in spirit. In his lifetime of 68 years, he penned the first Constitution of the Congregation in French, comprising 275 articles, and guided the sisters with values of simplicity, piety, service, and hospitality. Under his thirty-year leadership, the Congregation flourished, establishing 10 convents and 12 schools, which became sanctuaries of learning, service, and empowerment, especially for the marginalized.

Fr. Dupuis entered into eternal rest on June 4, 1874, leaving behind a monumental legacy. His mission expanded like a banyan tree, offering shelter to countless women and the underprivileged. With growing numbers, the Congregation welcomed candidates from Kerala. However, language barriers necessitated a cordial division on April 7, 1947, creating two distinct branches: FIHM – Pondicherry and FIH – Quilon.

Evolution, Governance, and Pontifical Status

After Fr. Dupuis' passing, the Congregation was shepherded by four MEP Directors and two native diocesan priests. These leaders revised the Constitution, convened Chapter meetings, and elected new Superiors General to ensure the Congregation's growth and relevance. With changing times, the Congregation continued to evolve to meet new challenges.

In 1978, under the papacy of Pope John Paul I, the Congregation was elevated to Pontifical status, marking a new chapter of expansion and service. The Constitutions were updated to align with the directives of Vatican II and the new Code of Canon Law. With divine guidance, the Congregation extended its mission beyond Indian shores, establishing a global presence.

A Global Presence and Enduring Mission

- In 1990, the Congregation was divided into three provinces:
- Our Lady of Lourdes Province – Pondy - Cuddalore
- St. Joseph Province – Trichy
- Infant Jesus Province – Madurai

In 1998, a fourth province, Assisi Province, was established in Keesara, Andhra Pradesh. The Congregation further expanded its outreach by establishing a regional presence in East Africa in 2002. Today, FIHM boasts 1,000+ sisters, serving in 178 convents across 9 countries, continuing its mission of selfless service and empowerment of women.

The Generalate of the Congregation is located on St. Therese Street, Pondicherry. At present, 17 convents, including those abroad, operate under the direct

administration of the Generalate. The four provinces and the East Africa Region comprise the following:

- Our Lady of Lourdes Province – 39 convents
- St. Joseph Province – 43 convents
- Infant Jesus Province – 39 convents
- Assisi Province – 29 convents
- Dupuis Region, East Africa – 11 convents

The Congregation's profound motto, "Love and Sacrifice," resonates through its foundational charism: "The Sanctification of Sisters for the Sanctification of Women." From its inception, the Congregation has been unwavering in its commitment to the empowerment of women through education—a transformative force at the heart of its mission. Driven by this vision, the sisters established a formidable network of over 100 primary, high, and secondary schools, aligned with both state and central boards. These institutions became bastions of learning, empowering countless young women to build brighter futures for themselves, their families and their communities.

As society advanced at an unprecedented pace, with monumental strides in human civilization, science, and technology, the Congregation recognized the ever-evolving needs of women. Responding to these demands, it expanded its mission beyond foundational schooling, embracing the call for higher education. Today, the Immaculate Sisters stand at the forefront of global education, administering 14 premier institutes of higher learning. These institutions, both nationally and internationally, deliver cutting-edge, specialized programs, providing women around the world with the tools to thrive in a modern, interconnected society.

Conclusion

The Congregation, founded on the visionary principles of Servant of God, Fr. Dupuis, stands as a living testament to his legacy. What began as a seed planted in the challenging soil of opposition has grown into a mighty tree, offering refuge and hope to the downtrodden, especially women. With its unwavering commitment to service, education, and empowerment, the FIHM Congregation continues to forge ahead, shining as a beacon of light in a world that still yearns for justice and equality.

EXAMINATION SYSTEM

There are two components in the evaluation and assessment of a student, namely Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and Semester Examination (SE). The CIA will take place during the course of the semester and the SE shall be conducted at the end of each semester. i.e., the Odd Semester in November-December and the Even Semester in April-May.

CONTINUOUS INTERNAL ASSESSMENT

- ✓ The component and actual conduct of CIA are entrusted to the respective Departments.
- ✓ The maximum marks for CIA is 25 for UG Courses.
- ✓ Two written tests are conducted centrally and the average is taken. In case a student is absent for a valid reason, another test may be conducted at the discretion of the Principal.
- ✓ There is no provision for improvement of CIA.
- ✓ Attendance marks are to be given for each paper for UG.

EXAMINATIONS

1. Students should enter the exam hall at the stroke of first bell. No one can enter the hall 30 minutes after the commencement of test or examination.
2. No student will be allowed to leave the examination hall within two hours after the commencement of the examination.
3. Students are prohibited from bringing/carrying into the Examination hall any book or portion of a book, manuscript or any matter of any description. Any communication with another is subject to severe punishment.
4. No paper other than the question paper should be taken out of the examination hall.
5. Students indulging in malpractice will be dealt with as per the directives of the State Government and Periyar University.

RULES REGARDING WRITING ARREARS

Every Semester, two or three weeks prior to the date of submission of semester exam applications, the list of courses offered by the Department in that semester will be published in the departments. Students are advised to apply for those courses.

All the students are required to sign the Continuous Internal Assessment Mark sheets. Requests for correction in C.I.A. marks after the date for signing will not be entertained.

Applications for Semester Examinations are distributed through the Departments. After paying the prescribed fees at the College Office, students should submit the same in the college office on or before the prescribed dates. Applications submitted after the due dates will not be accepted.

Mark sheets for the Semester I, II, III, IV and V will be distributed to the Parents on a notified date normally during Parents-Teachers' Meet. For the VI Semester, the mark sheets will be distributed to the students within one month from the publication of results by the University.

Parents and Students are welcome to meet the concerned authorities for any clarification or grievance.

CERTIFICATE

- A former or present student desiring to obtain a certificate (transfer, age, conduct, bonafide, course completion, etc..) shall apply for it by making a formal written request to the Principal.
- A Certificate will not generally be issued in less than 24 hours' notice.

SCHOLARSHIPS

- Those who wish to apply for or renew scholarship can have the application forms from the College Office. Duly filled in application should reach the College Office on or before the due date.
- Scholarship will be disbursed to students only after the amount is sent to the Principal by the Government. Students should sign the register on receipt of the scholarship.
- All money due to the College will be recovered from the scholarship amount at the time of disbursement. Intimation will be sent to parents and the balance amount if any, will be disbursed only after reply is received from them.
- As per the present rules and regulations of the Government, each scholarship holder is expected to open a saving account in a national bank, wherein the amount will be credited directly by the Government.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Application for admission to the degree courses must be made in the prescribed form. Applicants should have completed 17 years and 6 months on the 15th day of July of the current year.
2. Incomplete application forms will be rejected. All admissions are provisional and subject to the approval of the University.
3. The Principal reserves the right to cancel the admission of the provisionally selected applicants at any time without assigning any reason.

FEES REGULATION

1. Newly admitted students shall pay their fees in full for the first semester at the time of admission.
2. Students who withdraw during the course of the year are required to pay the entire college fees and other fees of that year.
3. Students are permitted to pay the examination fees only after they pay their college fees.
4. Students, who leave the college during the course, cannot claim any portion of the fees paid.

CONDUCT DURING CLASS HOURS

1. When a teacher enters the classroom, all students should stand and greet him/her. They should sit only when they are asked to do so. At the end of the class, students should stand till the teacher leaves the room.
2. During working hours no student is allowed to enter or leave the classroom without the permission of the teacher.
3. During working hours' students should avoid loitering on the verandas and college campus. They should be either in the classroom or in the library as instructed by the class teacher concerned.
4. When in transit from one class to another, students shall walk silently and in an orderly manner.
5. Students attending meetings and other gatherings should conduct themselves with dignity, decorum and maintain silence.

ATTENDANCE

All the students are expected to attend classes every day without fail. However, students can avail leave after obtaining permission from the Vice-Principal on genuine grounds.

1. Daily attendance of students is marked in a register by individual teachers for every period.
2. 80% attendance is a pre-requisite for;
 - I. Permission to write the Semester Exams
 - II. Award of Scholarships of any kind. No exemption will be granted.
3. If a student is absent for one period in a day, he/she will be marked absent for one period only. Two such one periods of absence will be marked as half a day and three such single periods of absence will be marked as full day.

LEAVE LETTER

1. The leave letter must be duly signed by parents/guardian/Hostel Director for genuine reasons well in advance with the prior approval of the HOD.
2. In the case of unforeseen circumstances, a leave letter must be submitted on the first day of return to the class in the proper form.
3. Medical leave letter must be submitted to the HOD with the endorsement of parents and medical certificate.

CODE OF RELATIONSHIP

They shall respect each other and follow the directions strictly with regard to code of conduct on and off the campus.

CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

1. Student found using drugs and ragging on the campus will be summarily dismissed from the college.
2. Whether on or off the college campus, students are to conduct themselves decently.
3. Students should not indulge in anti-social activities of any kind.
4. Under the Educational Rules of the Government, the Principal has full power to impose on students the following punishments: fine, suspension and expulsion from the college.
5. Use of mobile phones by the students is prohibited inside the college campus.
6. All the students shall wear the Identity Card inside the campus and while representing our college for specific programme.
7. Talking in English in the college – premises is mandatory.

DRESS CODE

Every student is expected to be in simple and modest formal dress. Girls are expected to be either in saree with sleeved blouse or chudithar or salwar kameez with sleeved long kurtha with thuppatta.

DISCIPLINARY RULES

The following are strictly forbidden: any violation of these rules will result in dismissal / suspension from the college:

1. Ragging of any kind and of any magnitude inside / outside the college campus.
2. Any kind of wild noisy and disturbing behaviour / celebrations in the campus.
3. Smoking in the campus (including College Hostel).
4. Possession / use of drugs, alcohol or peddling drugs in the campus or anywhere else.
5. Tampering with the contents or misuse of the college identity cards, train / bus identity cards, passes, tickets and tokens.
6. Any kind of misconduct / misbehaviour inside / outside the campus (in public places, buses, etc.) or unruly behaviour in buses or any kind of annoyance to fellow students will also result in the immediate withdrawal / permanent cancellation of student travel concessions and the scholarships.
7. Malpractices such as cheating, bribing, gambling, copying in tests and exams, giving false declarations, spreading rumours / unfounded accusations / writing / printing / distributing/ displaying unauthorized notices of any kind, etc., in the campus or anywhere else.
8. Inviting / meeting strangers or unauthorized person inside the campus without written permission from the Principal.
9. Causing damage to college / public property.
10. Canvassing the students in any unpermitted manner during Students Council Election.

LIBRARY

1. Absolute silence must be maintained in and around the library.
2. Both the Library & Browsing Centre are open from 9.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. on all working days and on all Saturdays.
3. While entering the library, all have to register their names.
4. Personal belongings such as Bags, Tiffin-boxes, Notebooks, etc., should be left at the entrance of the library in the place allotted for it.
5. Books are to be borrowed or returned between 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. and 1.15 p.m. to 4.30p.m.
6. Books are usually lent for a period of two weeks and may be renewed for further period, if those books are not in demand by other students.
7. Students are allowed to take upto three books by using their own ID card.
8. Books should be returned on or before the due date indicated in the issue-slip of the book. An overdue fine of Rs.1 per day will be charged if the book is not returned in time.
9. The Librarian may ask for the return of any book even before the expiry of the due date on demand.
10. Reference Books such as dictionaries, yearbooks, encyclopaedia and books labelled as Reference will not be lent.
11. Students are forbidden to make any marking or underlining in books and periodicals.

12. Students are advised to examine and ascertain the conditions of the book at the time of borrowing itself. If there is any damage, it should be immediately brought to the notice of the librarian. Otherwise, the borrower will be held responsible for the damage.
13. If a book is damaged or lost, the cost of replacing it with a new copy along with fine will be recovered from the borrower. If one book in a set of books is damaged or lost, the cost of replacing the whole set will be recovered.
14. All students should produce their identity card at the time of borrowing library books.
15. Students should return books borrowed from the library a week before the last working day of the semester.
16. While borrowing books, the student shall verify the book pocket card and accession number to be the same.
17. Members of the Teaching Faculty can borrow up to five books at a time. They must return the books on or before the last Monday of the respective semester.

ECO-FRIENDLY ZONE

The cleanliness of the college building, furniture and surroundings should be the personal responsibility of every student. It is the duty and responsibility of every student to keep the campus litter free zone.

NOTICE BOARD

1. Students are expected to read the information displayed on the notice boards daily. Ignorance of any notice will not be accepted as an excuse.
2. Students shall neither tamper with the notice put up on the notice boards nor shall they fix any notice on the notice board without the permission of the Principal/ Vice-Principal.

COLLEGE BUS

1. A student using the College bus is expected to be at the bus stop at least ten minutes before the scheduled arrival of the bus. Buses will NOT wait for late comers. The student has to be on the correct side of the arriving bus.
2. Students are allowed to use only their allotted bus and bus stop. No changes will be allowed without prior permission of the Vice-principal (Administration).
3. No student should come near the entry / exit door of the bus until it comes to a complete halt.
4. All students must occupy the seats allotted immediately after boarding their respective buses.
5. Students will sit in the seats allotted to them and are responsible for the area in which they sit at. Any damage inflicted to the bus will be paid for by the student(s) responsible.
6. Tampering with emergency door, windows, bus seats or equipment's is prohibited.
7. Students are strictly not allowed to misuse of any electronic gadgets like cell phones/mobile phones, cameras, etc. inside the bus.
8. Harassment, aggressive behaviour, bullying, shouting, fighting, or discriminatory / abusive language or conduct towards the driver / attendant or other people is prohibited.
9. At any case, don't speak with other genders without prior permission of the bus In-charges
10. No student is allowed to enter the driver's cabin in the bus.
11. Consumption of edibles is not permitted in the bus.
12. One-way transport facility is not provided.
13. Parents and Hostellers are not allowed to board the bus for any reason.
14. Parents / guardians of students shall not compel the bus employee to divert any route or change any pick-up or drop-off point allotted at the beginning of the year.

15. The bus route may be altered temporarily if the road condition hinders smooth plying of buses and in such cases students and parents are requested to cooperate with transport department.
16. Indiscipline /misbehaviour in the bus or non-payment of bus fees may lead to cancellation of the bus facility for the student. Bus facility is a privilege for any person desiring to avail the facility. The College retains the right to deny the facility to anyone without providing any reason whatsoever.
17. Any indiscipline in the bus will be reported to the College Vice-principal (Administration) for necessary action.
18. The student must wear their ID card at the entry.
19. In case of any misbehaviour or violation of the college bus rules, ID cards of the students will be with the Disciplinary committee members till the enquiry is over.

HOSTELS

Jayarani Women's Hostel is closely-knit units of Jayarani family.

- The main concern of hostel is character formation coupled with intellectual formation of the students. Our hostel is a home away from home, a temple of learning and a family that has a long living tradition.
- All the inmates are expected to co-operate fully with the Director and Assistant Directors and with one another in achieving these objectives. They should not engage any activity which may be detrimental to realizing these two objectives.

Admission to Hostels

Students will be admitted to the Hostel only after admission to the College and a personal interview with the Hostel Director. The parent of the candidate has to be present at the interview by the Director. Application for admission in the form prescribed should be accompanied by a certificate from the Parish Priest (for Catholics) and from the authorities of the hostel or institution where the student previously resided. Membership of the Hostel is for only one year. Senior students wishing to be readmitted will repeat the same procedure for readmission. Those who have not shown sufficient improvement in their studies and have been failing consistently in the examinations may be denied renewal of membership. Dismissal or suspension of a member from the College will involve automatic dismissal or suspension from the Hostel also.

To Parents

Parents and Guardians are requested to co-operate with college authorities in the formation of good character, in maintaining regularity in attendance and progress in studies of their children/wards. Warning letters will be sent to parents of the students who are irregular in attendance. At the same time, parents and guardians are advised to check in person with HODs/Vice-Principal regarding the attendance of their children/wards. All the parents/guardians have to come with their wards for Parents-Teachers' Meeting.
